This action takes Henry back 40 years to the height of the war when young Henry's life was filled with confusion. Henry is convinced that the parasol belongs to Keiko, his childhood friend. The novel continues and readers explore the friendship of Keiko and Henry and their extraordinary story of commitment and hope set in one of the most conflicted and volatile times in American history.

#### **About Jamie Ford**

Jamie Ford is the great grandson of a Nevada mining pioneer, Min Chung, who emigrated from Kaiping, China to San Francisco in 1865, where he adopted the name, "Ford", thus confusing future generations. Ford grew up in Seattle near Chinatown but now resides in Montana. His debut novel, Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet, was published in 2009 and became an international bestseller that has been translated in to 34 languages. In 2010, Ford received the Asian/Pacific Award for Literature.
