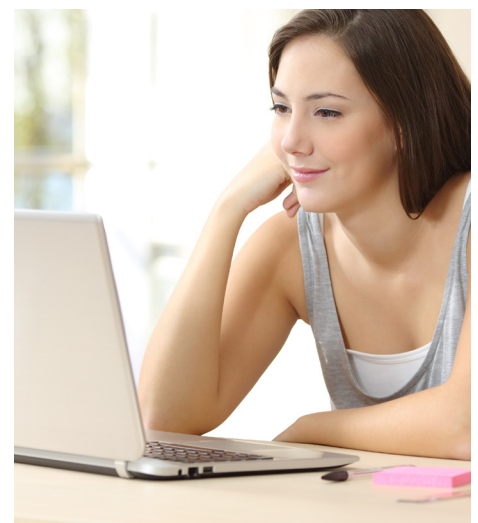
Paying for College Night 2016!

Summer 2016 - Friday Fieldtrips

1. Ford Rouge Factory Tour –

The highlight of this tour by far was the Manufacturing Innovation Theater. It is a multisensory exploration of the manufacturing of the Ford F-150. It includes special effects, 3D laser projection and high-energy audio. Afterwards the students enjoyed pizza at Detroit's famous Buddy's Pizza (a Detroit original).



2. Museum of African American History & Motown Museum -

Many of the students enjoyed the opportunity to explore and celebrate African American history and learn about the Motown Record Company in Detroit, Michigan.

3. Cedar Point – This trip is a favorite by all the students. The weather was

nice and we returned with all, safe and sound, although a bit tired from the long day.

4. Eastern Michigan University and Siena Heights University -

Each summer we visit area colleges and universities within driving distance of MCCC. The students are given a campus tour, admissions presentation and sometimes meet with other Upward Bound students.

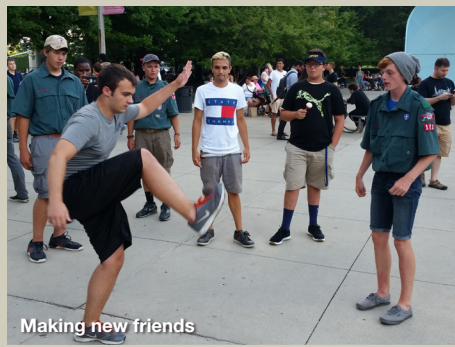


DAY 1

Mile of Murals Tour



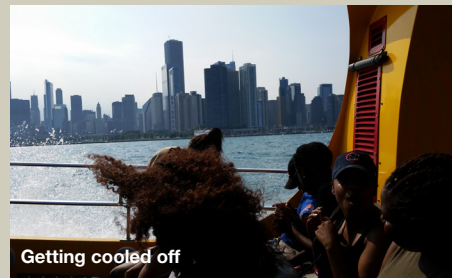
DAY 3

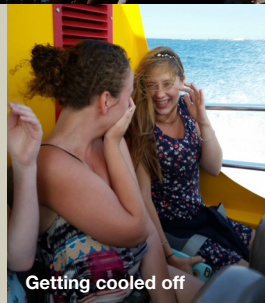

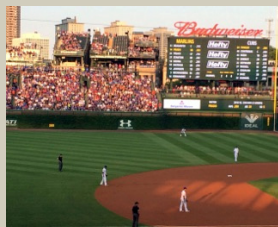


View from the Sea Dog Boat

Welcome back to the 2016-2017 school year Monroe High School Upward Bound students! Hope your school year is off to a great start! Monroe High School Upward Bound after-school tutoring will begin on Thursday, September 29, 2016, in room A-111 from 2:30-4:20. Also, at that time, we will have a pizza party to kick off the brand new school year. Transportation is available for MHS UB students at approximately 4:00 p.m. near the flagpole. Ms. Lambert will be issuing bus tickets.

The following is important information for Seniors:

College Applications and Fee Waivers:

Seniors, if you have not already started applying to colleges/universities, it is NOW time to start. Upward Bound will take care of any and all application fees. Provide me with the information on where you are applying; and, I will submit a college application fee waiver letter to that institution on your behalf.

October Michigan College Month:

The goal of Michigan College Month is that by the conclusion of October, every graduating senior has submitted at least one college application, applied for at least one scholarship, and filed the FAFSA. Upward Bound students are required to do the same, but they must fill out at least three college applications, and again at NO cost to the student.

SAT Fee Waivers:

Fee waivers are available in the Monroe High School career and counseling center. See me if you need assistance.

Scholarships:

There are thousands of scholarships available out there from all sorts of institutions and organizations. Scholarships are available through your high school, the colleges/universities one is applying to, locally, nationally, and through businesses and corporations.

Here we go again, Upward Bound parents and students! We have a new school year and more great adventures ahead of us. We have a new class of freshmen walking the halls of the high school for the first time, and a new class of seniors beginning the last leg of their high school journey.

As we go through the year, each class will have its own unique set of priorities and challenges:

Freshmen: It's your first year at the high school. Your job this year is to settle in and get used to a new routine and a more challenging workload. You will also need to figure out how to get organized—and stay organized—and Upward Bound will be here to help you. Hopefully, the Summer Program gave you what you need to hit the ground running, but the after-school program will work with you throughout the year to get your high school career off to a great start.

Sophomores: This is your year to build on the success of your freshman year—and then to up your game. It's time to challenge yourself and set higher expectations. Turn those C's into B's and those B's into A's this year. It is also time for you to step up and set an example for the freshmen—and to lend them a helping hand when they need one. Remember your first year and how great it would have been to have someone else show you the ropes!

Juniors: Your top priority this year is to prepare for the SAT, which you will take in the spring. You have your PSAT scores and your Khan Academy accounts, as well as the excellent Upward Bound tutors, so you have everything you need to do well on that test. The rest is up to you. You will also want to research careers and colleges, so you can make an informed decision when you start applying to colleges early next year.

Seniors: Seniors should be focused on applying to colleges, (they should have them all done by the end of October), filing their FAFSA (beginning Oct. 1), and filling out scholarship applications. Upward Bound and the high school counseling staff are available to help with all of the above. Other top priorities include staying on top of your game and resisting the onset of senioritis. It's too early to start coasting. I'll let you know when the time is right. (Hint: the time is never right! Lol!)

The Upward Bound After-School Program is here to help students with whatever they need to be successful. Attendance is vital—you can't help if you don't show up! What is Upward Bound?

Upward Bound is a program funded by the U.S. Department of Education that prepares high school students for post-secondary education. Established in 2007, Monroe County Community College Upward Bound serves 110 students, grades 9-12. Students are enrolled from our target high school, Monroe High School, located in Monroe, Michigan and Airport High School located in Carleton, Michigan. Upward Bound is a challenging, preparatory program for students who demonstrate the ability or desire to attend college. All program services are free for participants.

Mission

The mission of the Monroe County Community College Upward Bound program is to assist students in grades nine through twelve in the successful completion of high school and to prepare them for post-secondary education by providing academic support, college preparation, social, cultural and career exploration.
